Ground Breaking of New OAS Wing


The Open Arms Shelter will soon have a wing to keep more children long-term. The ground breaking ceremony took place Tuesday, March 1 and completion of the wing is scheduled for July.

OAS Director, Pat Beaverson, stressed the importance of the entire village in raising these kids and that Lonoke is a great place with people and businesses involved in helping these children. He acknowledged Susan Bransford as the driving force behind the Open Arms program and how fortunate he was to take over such a well-run program.

Shelby Hillman, who has served on the board since the inception of OAS and retired off this year says, "Under the leadership of Susan Bransford, the board went from a vision to an idea. She suggested we needed a new wing to keep older teens who could either graduate from high school or earn a

G.E.D. We would then be able to house young mothers with babies and help them, as well as boys who are about to turn 18, prepare themselves for jobs and an opportunity to

support themselves.'



existing dining area and provide additional food storage.

The \$1.1 million dollar project is being funded through grants, loans and donations. The Arkansas Economic Development Commission

in Lonoke awarded a grant of \$215,000 to the shelter.

"We are glad this project is going to bring in a few more jobs to this community and be helping children. We are always

delighted to help with these kinds of projects that help our community," says Amanda Leigh of The AR Economic Development Commission.

The shelter also received a plague from Lawrence McCullough of the United States Department of Agriculture in recognition of the low-interest loan of \$700,000 given to the shelter by the USDA. The shelter is currently seeking private donations and support for the remainder of the cost. Please consider filling out the donation form on the following page or buying a brick. Get Your Pumpkins and Race For the Children at The Great Pumpkin Patch and 5K Race

Start thinking now about the Great Pumpkin Patch and 5K coming October 2, 2011 to Lonoke. Last year's pumpkin patch landed on a beautiful fall day and raised \$3000 for the shelter. This year, a 5k walk/run/race will also be going on during the pumpkin patch.

For serious racers, the race coarse will be certified and Macs timing service will be used for pinpoint finish line timing. This involves a computer chip put on each racers shoes so that when they cross the finish line an exact race time will be sent to the computer. Groups will be divided by age and gender, and prizes for winners of these groups will

include medals, free pumpkins and pumpkin displays.

More relaxed runners and walking groups are also welcome. Drinks and snacks will be provided and, of coarse, lots of pumpkins and activities at the pumpkin patch including

face painting and pumpkin decorating for kids, a professional photographer to take fall family photos, homemade treats for sale, along with mums, hay bales, and many varieties of pumpkins and gourds to choose from including specialty painted pumpkins.
